'Once Upon a Time' at St Paul's School

I joined the CPA team visiting St Paul's in 2012 to help with child protection training, and **being a sometime author** of children's books, as a last minute afterthought, I packed one of my books and a story book written by children in a local Lincoln school under my guidance, just in case the work might be useful in some way.

To my delight, I did indeed begin a dialogue about **creativity, imagination and free writing,** during classroom discussions and free time. I talked about creating exciting characters and sending them on adventures, showing the staff and pupils what the British children had written and how I had arranged for their stories to be published as a book for each child to own. I realised then that we could do exactly the same for the children at St Paul's.

The staff and P7 children took up the idea in earnest, and a few months later. I

got a wonderful surprise when I was told a rough bundle of children's stories had arrived at the CPA office, with some children writing tiny original stories for the first time. I set about editing them, and forming them into the chapters of a book, however short, each child having their own author note about their hopes and likes, and CPA had their work spiral bound into little books and sent back, one for each child.

My aims were the same as for British children: to stimulate creative thinking and writing, promote a love of learning and improve literacy, and I am so thrilled that this annual project is helping to do this in Uganda too.

When the children see their story made into a real book to take home and treasure, **their achievement can have widespread benefits**, both to themselves and their communities.

The effect of the failure of the rains in Ethiopia last year continues to be felt through **severe food shortages** across the country. According to the Ethiopian Government, **10.2 million people need relief assistance**, in addition to the 7.9 million people the Government is already helping. The Government also estimates that 2.6 million people are experiencing moderate or severe acute malnutrition and that 5.8 million people lack access to appropriate water, sanitation and hygiene facilities.

To Western eyes, the scenes of hunger are disturbingly reminiscent of the country's infamous famine of 1984, which killed one million people and sparked the Live Aid campaign. This time around, the Ethiopian Government is much better placed to help its own people but the sheer scale of what they are facing means they have had to turn to the international community for assistance. However, humanitarian crises across the world have sucked attention and resources away and so this still has the possibility of turning into a **huge humanitarian disaster**.

Despite not having all the funding in place, the urgency of the situation compelled us to link with our partner in Ethiopia, Voice in the Wilderness Development Organisation (VWDO), and sign an agreement with the Ethiopian Government. The agreement is to **provide food supplements to 770 school children** in the Sefi Beret Community and their families all of whom have been identified as facing a serious risk of malnutrition. This is now in full swing with each child receiving a high calorie meal each day. Teachers, school children and their families, the Department of Education and an oversight committee are all working together to ensure that this is done as smoothly as possible. This will continue until the end of this calendar year, when the main harvest is due.

The feeding programme has meant that **children were able to sit their school exams** in June. Whilst not a matter of life and death, this has brought some semblance of normality and focus for the children, in otherwise extremely distressing circumstances.

Although this feeding programme is vital in the short term, what also became apparent was that the families had no seed left to plant this year. To take advantage of the rainy season (June to September), we also felt it was vital that we **provided seeds for families at the right time.**

In the context of a countrywide disaster, this programme is a drop in the ocean, but for the Sefi Beret community it is much needed and will save many lives. It tells the community, **"you are not forgotten!"**

Our hope and prayer is that the community of Sefi Beret can get through this crisis and start to rebuild their lives. For me, spending time thinking about this at a time when our own country is facing its own challenges has provided me with some much needed perspective. Ethiopia

Seed in Season at Sefi Beret

As you will have read CPA has tried to help the Sefi Beret community deal with the severe food shortages it has faced this year **by providing food** each day for all **770 children at the local primary school**. This is part of a coordinated Government campaign to try and reach all parts of the country who are suffering from the drought conditions.

Vital though the food relief is, **more needs to be done** to get the community back on its feet. With most of their assets depleted by the food shortages the community have not been able to buy seed to plant for this year's harvest. To help the community overcome this problem CPA provided, with Government By Donation of Serie Partners in Africa (CPA) Cooperating With Voice of Wilderness Developmental Organization (VWDO) July, 296

approval, seed for the 700 poorest households in the community, most of whom are women, farmers or widows. Local agricultural experts helped select the right type and quality of seed. This allowed these households to plant in time for the rainy season and should mean that they will have crops to harvest at the end of the year.

One of the farmers, Abere aged 35, said "I had no hope but I prepared my land and prayed for God to provide me a seed and He did it. I would like to say thank you for the organisation who provided seed at the right time and for showing us concern due to our difficult time."

MANY IN THE COMMUNITY HAVE EXPERIENCED THE LOSS OF THEIR LOVED ONES, LIVELIHOODS AND LIVESTOCK.

THE URGENCY OF THE SITUATION MEANT THAT CPA HAD TO MAKE THE COMMITMENT TO HELP BEFORE HAVING THE NECESSARY FUNDS IN PLACE. WE ARE LOOKING FOR £10,000 TO HELP FUND THE PROGRAMME FOR THE REST OF THE YEAR.

Hi everyone, I'm Laura and I've been volunteering with CPA for almost four years now. After my first trip in 2012, **I fell head over heels for Uganda** but my trips were never long enough. I decided to take three months unpaid leave from work last August and go back to 'my happy place' and volunteer.



Through my friends at CPA, I found out about **Caring Hands** and the recycled beads and jewellery made by their beneficiaries. I got in touch with Milla and another beautiful friendship was created. Whilst volunteering with them I realised there's a lot more to them as an organisation than simply making recycled paper beads.

They play a major part in local communities by **helping to empower families** that are living with, or have been affected by HIV/AIDs, by **teaching new skills** and helping them to make **sustainable changes for the future.** During my time there the staff work tirelessly teaching people how to read and write, carrying out home and school visits and setting up workshops for children and caregivers on 'Life Skills'. Some of these workshops include business skills, how to make sanitary wear to allow girls to stay in school, making briquettes for cooking that are more environmentally friendly and much safer to use, apprenticeships with local businesses, urban farming and of course how to make the recycled paper beads.

Caring Hands have a lot of activities that support **orphaned and vulnerable children.** They open the office grounds at the weekend providing a safe place for children to meet, play sports, learn traditional dancing, read and play music.

To help finance their work, they sell the **paper bead jewellery** made by the women, in various places around the

world including through 'White Nile' in the UK. They also sell handmade baskets and have recently started making beautifully handcrafted, recycled coin jewellery.
