
Lilongwe Lowdown - Winter 2017

The last two weeks have been busy preparing for the start of a new term on 11th September and I have done a number of new student assessments over the holidays. I'm so excited that our reputation has spread in the city and God is opening many doors; we closed last term with 15 pupils and will open with 23! We have also been able to employ a new teacher, taking our team up to five, which enables us to offer help to so many more people!

Our department has expanded to include a 16+ vocational training programme. Pupils will be given opportunities to learn kitchen skills, office filing, attend gardening programmes, as well as to attend placements working with younger children in the nursery! We are hoping to find funding for other recreational activities such as, hair and beauty, debates, sports and video games, and we would like to create a small kitchen area where pupils can make their own snacks and coffee.
